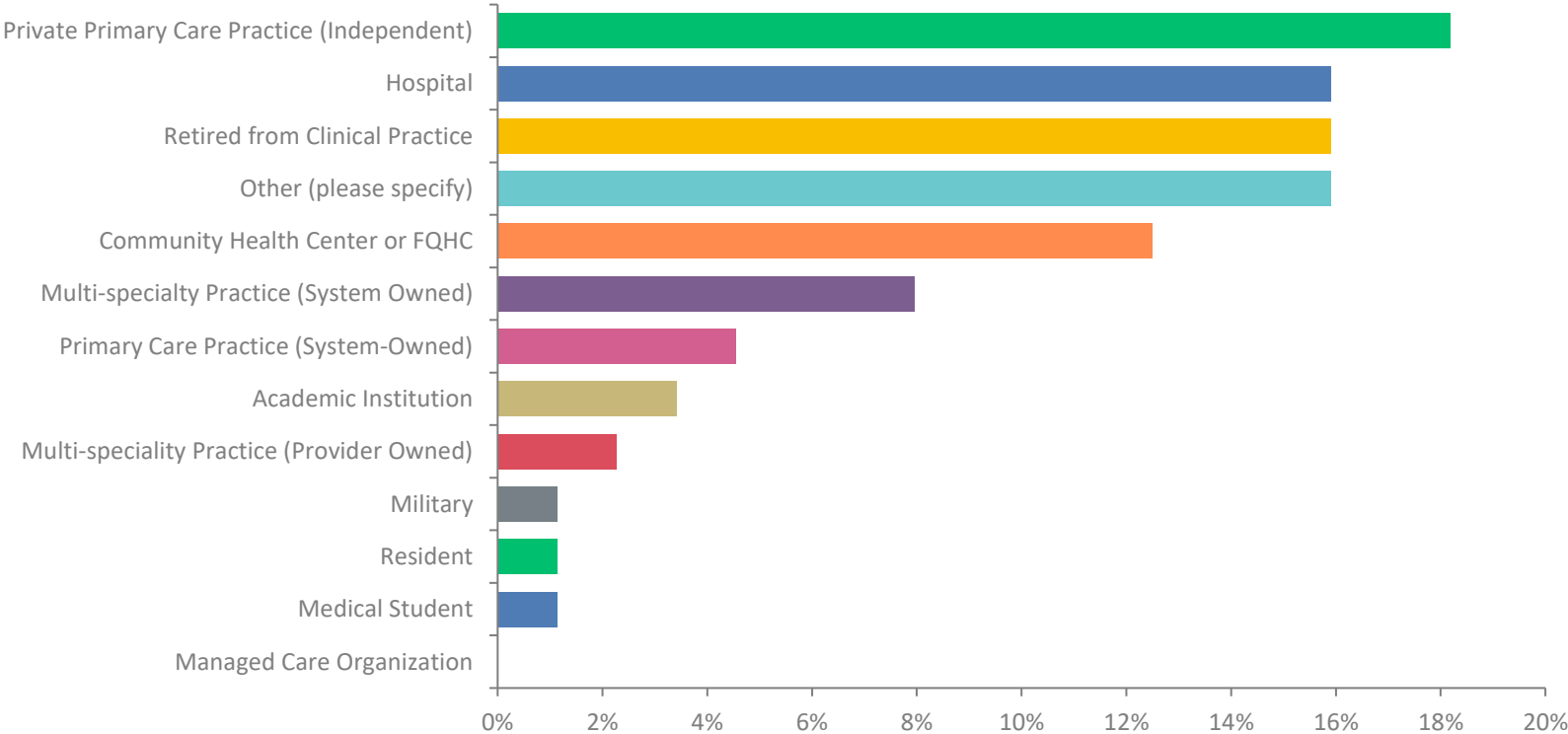

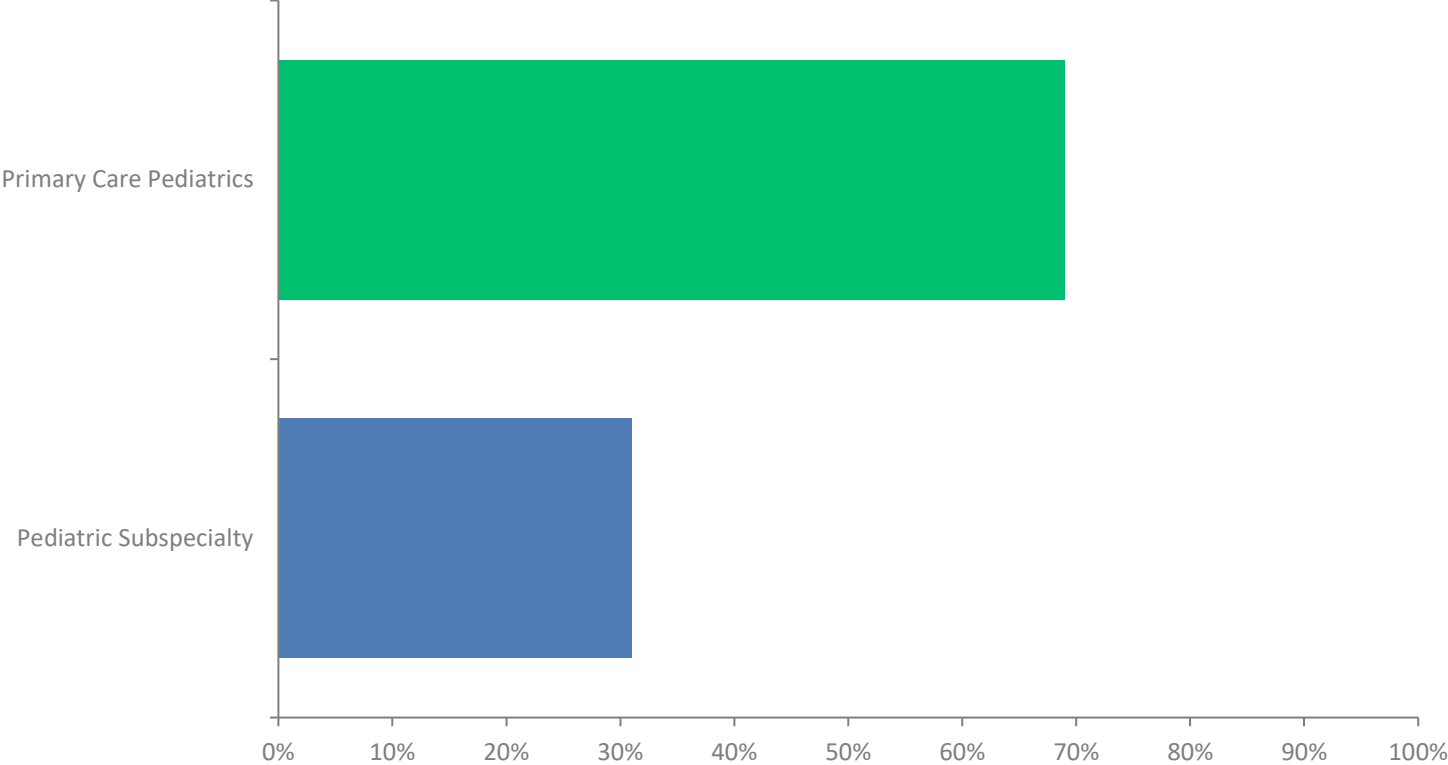

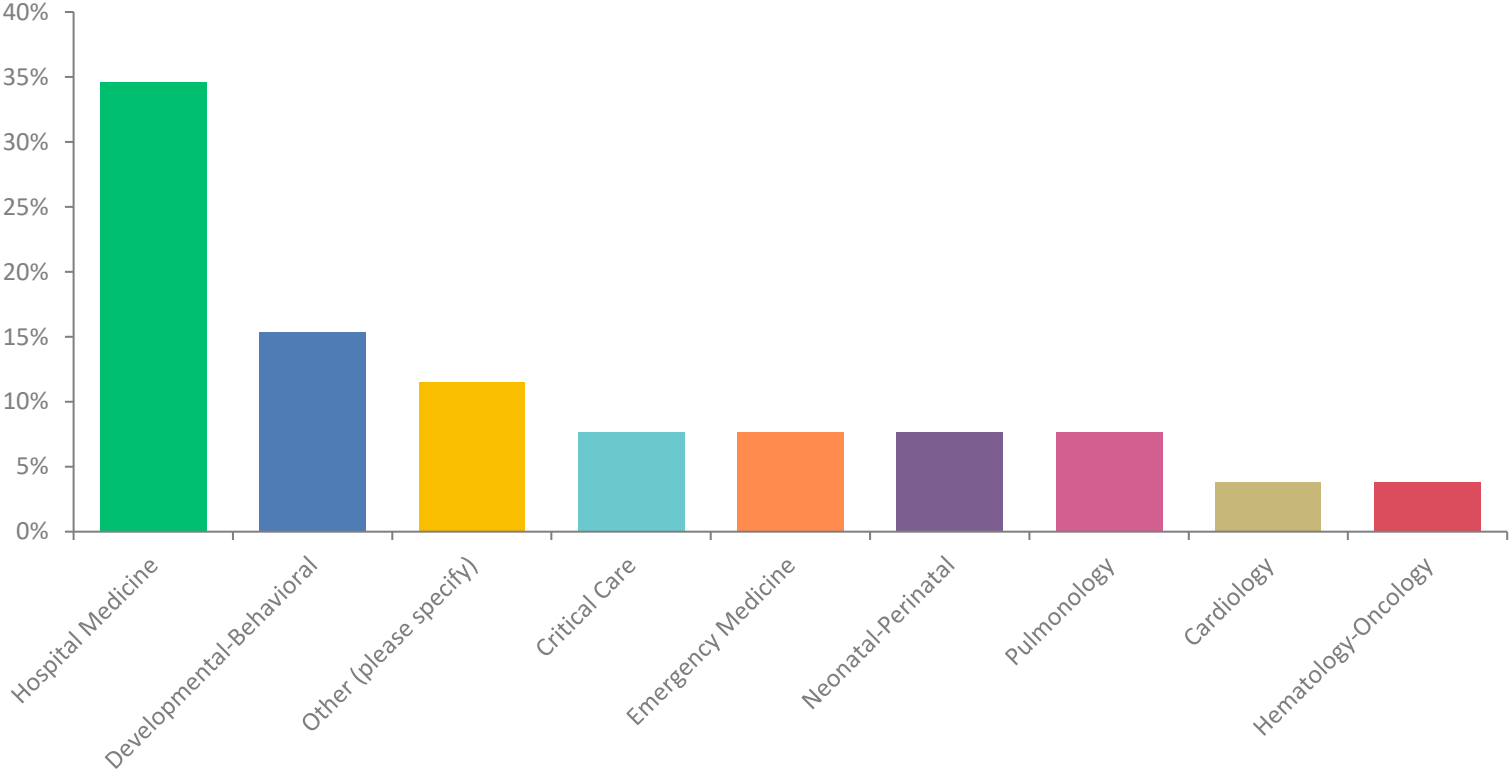
# Which of the following best describes your practice setting?



# Please indicate your professional area of work:



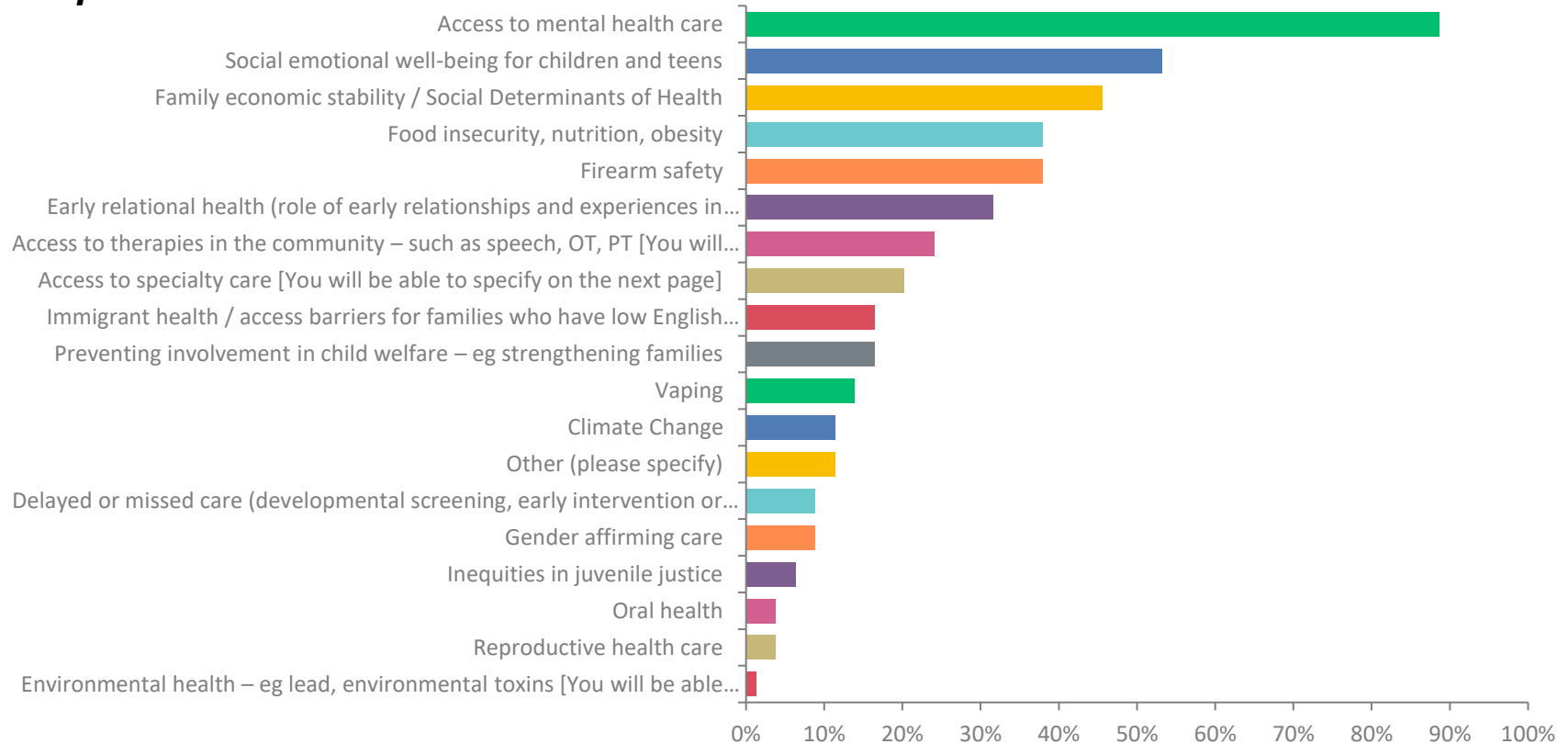

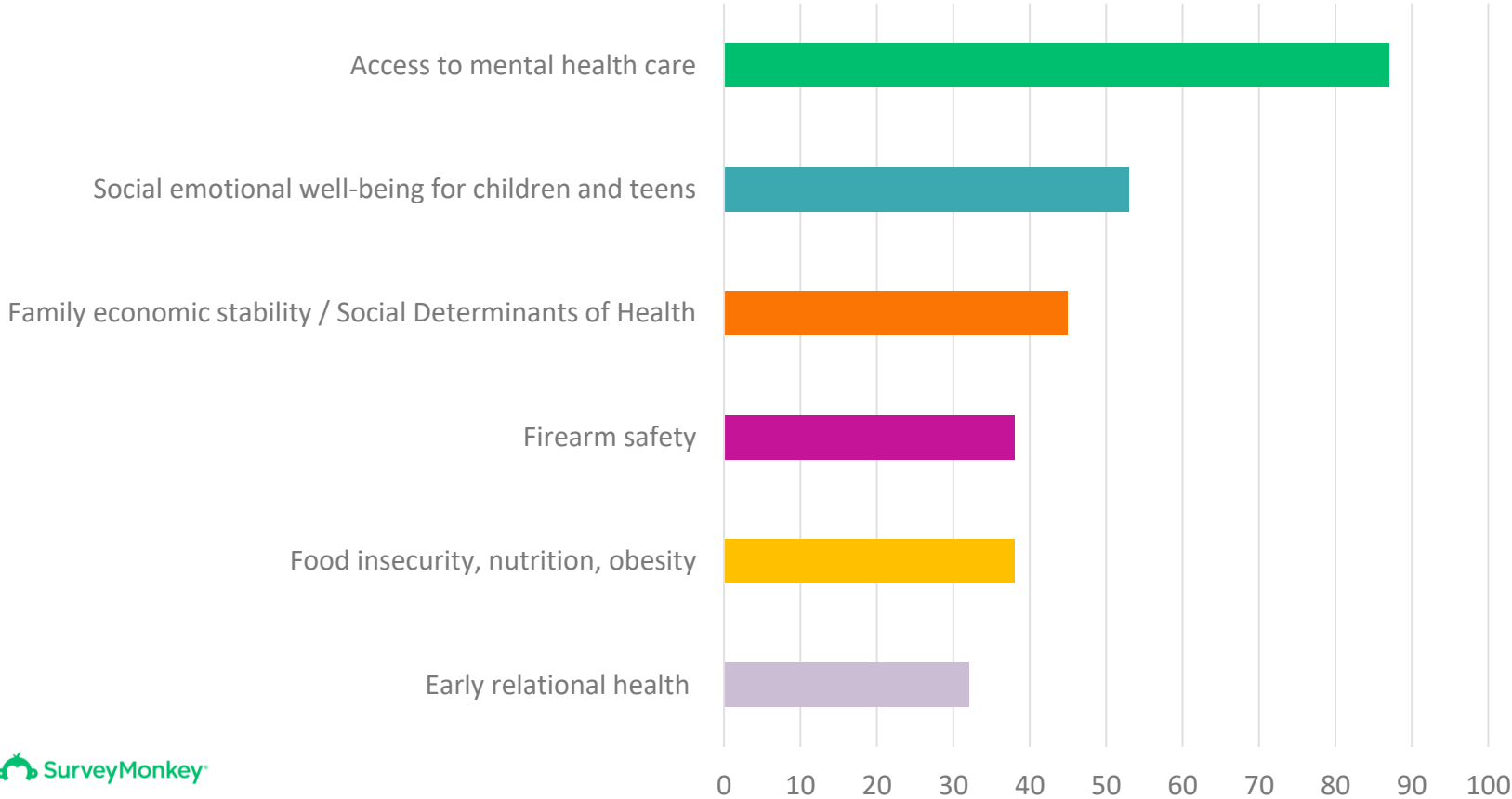
# What child health inequities or gaps are most pressing for children and youth in your community that WCAAP could focus our legislative advocacy on?

### Payment Issues:

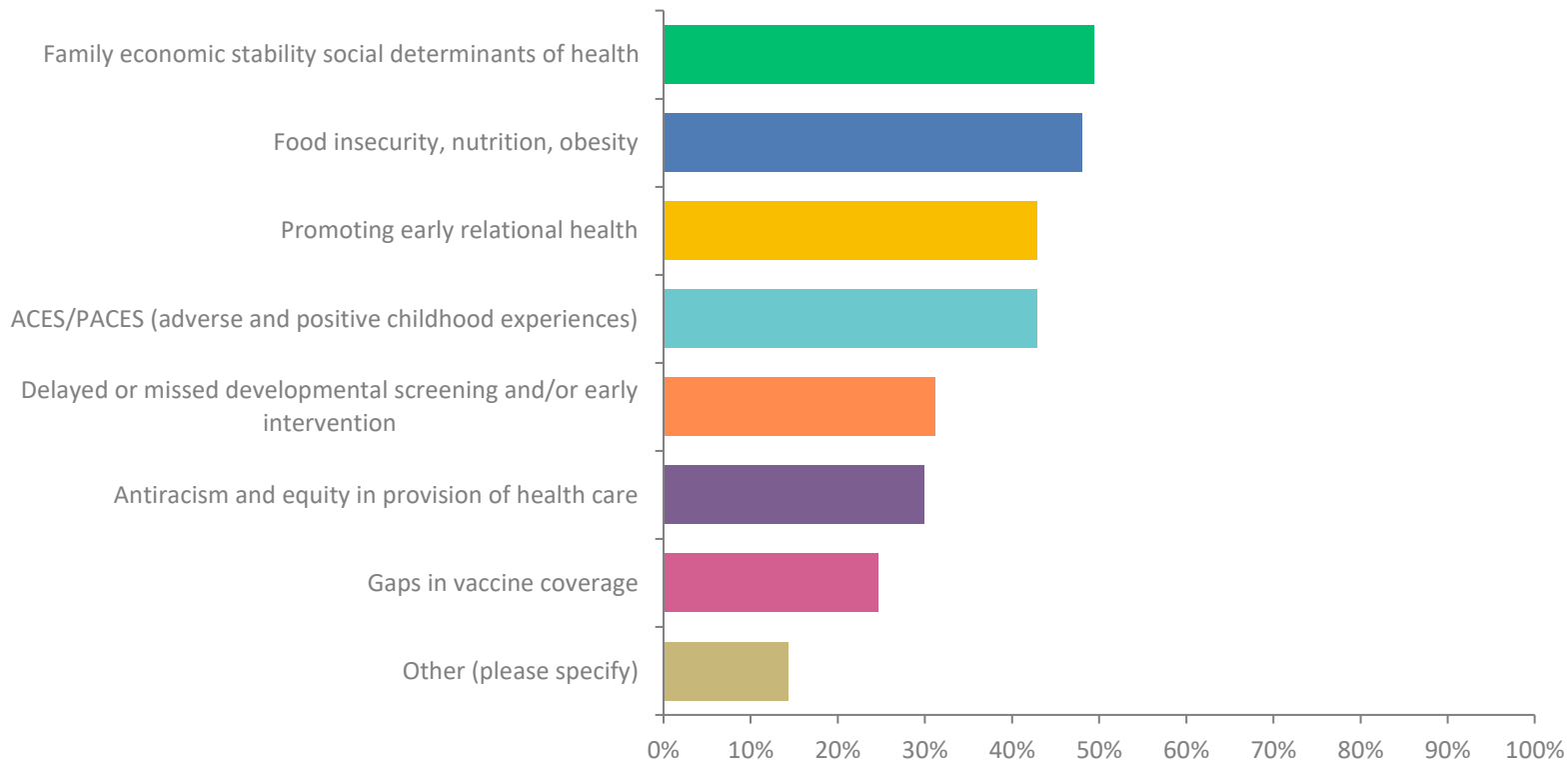
- Medicaid reimbursements

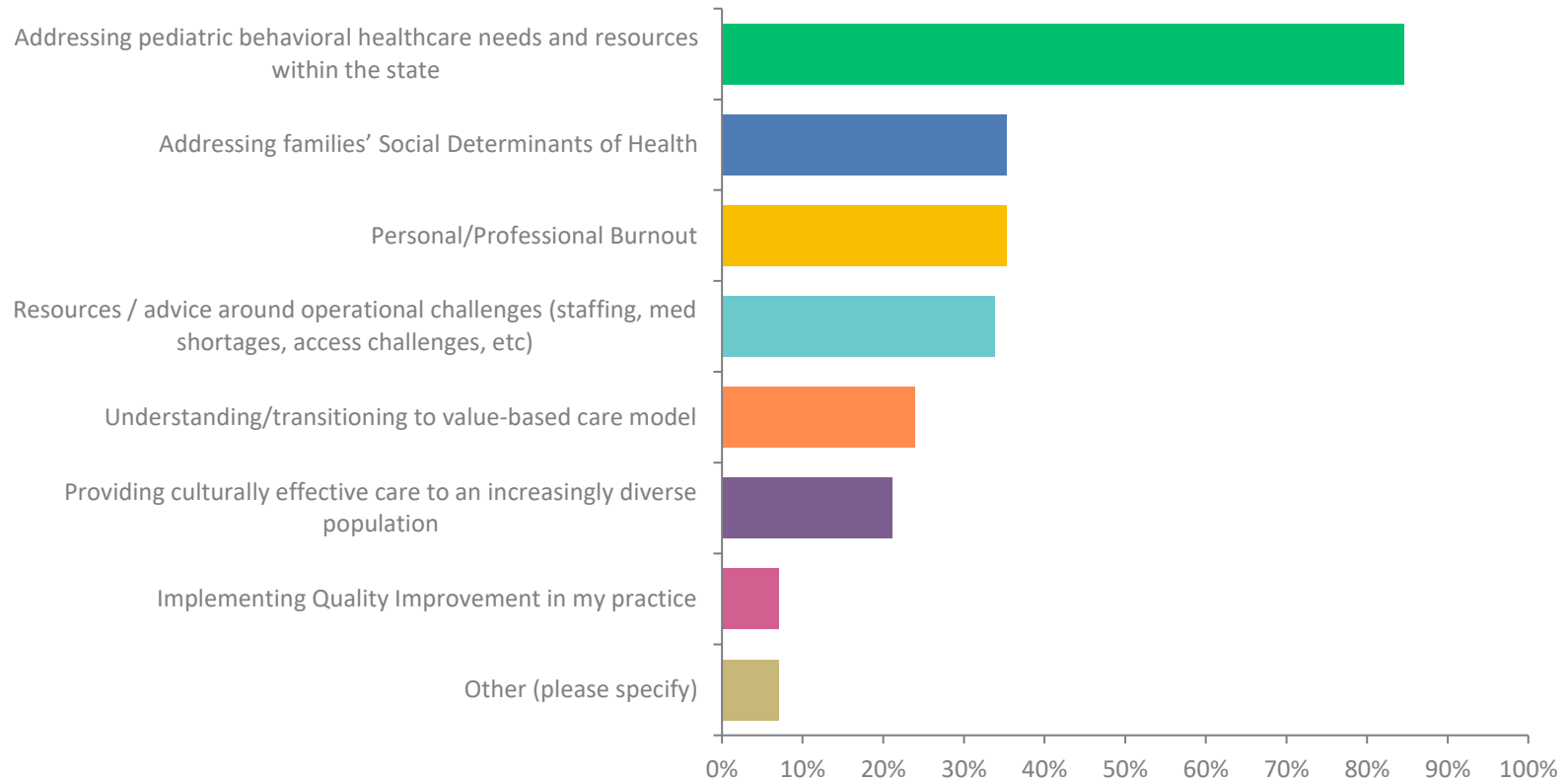
- Impact of technology on kids/families, social media

- Counseling and self regulation via self hypnosis skills



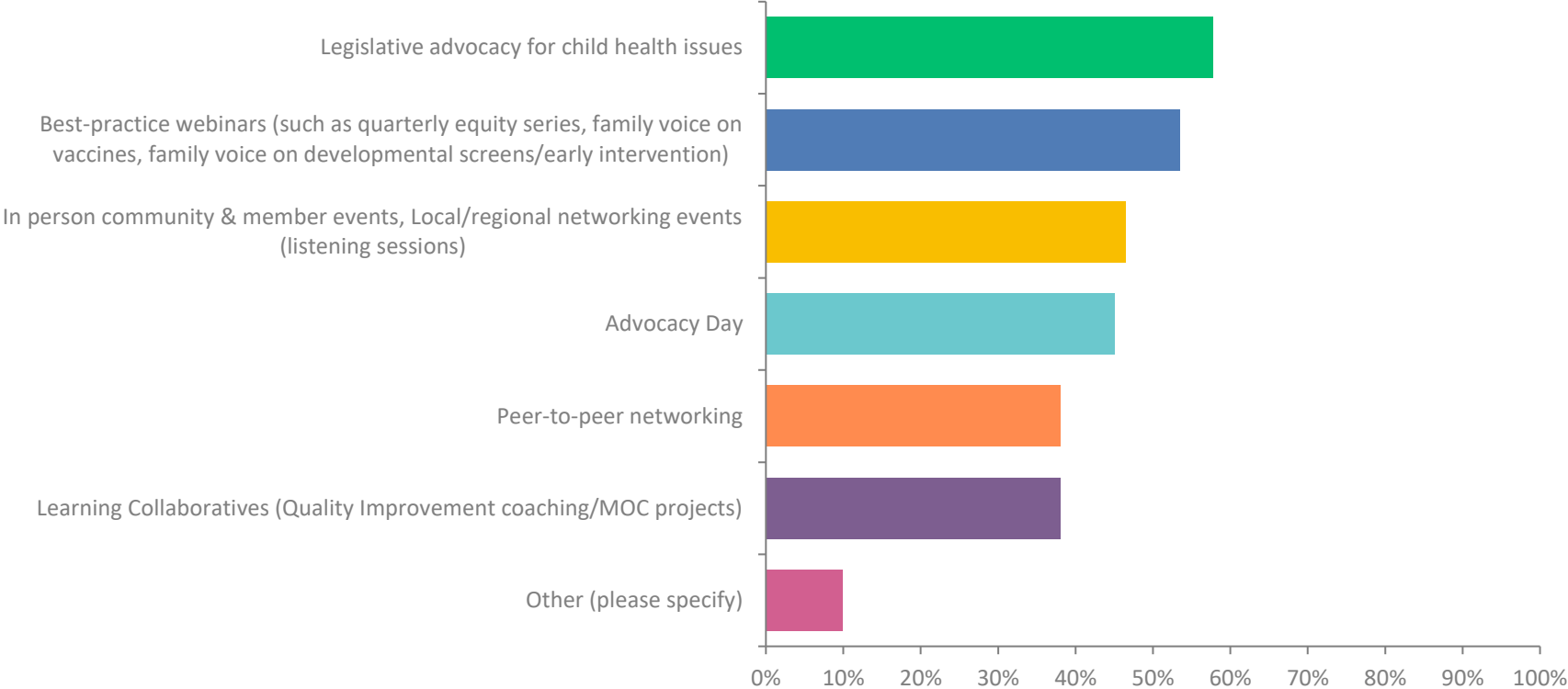

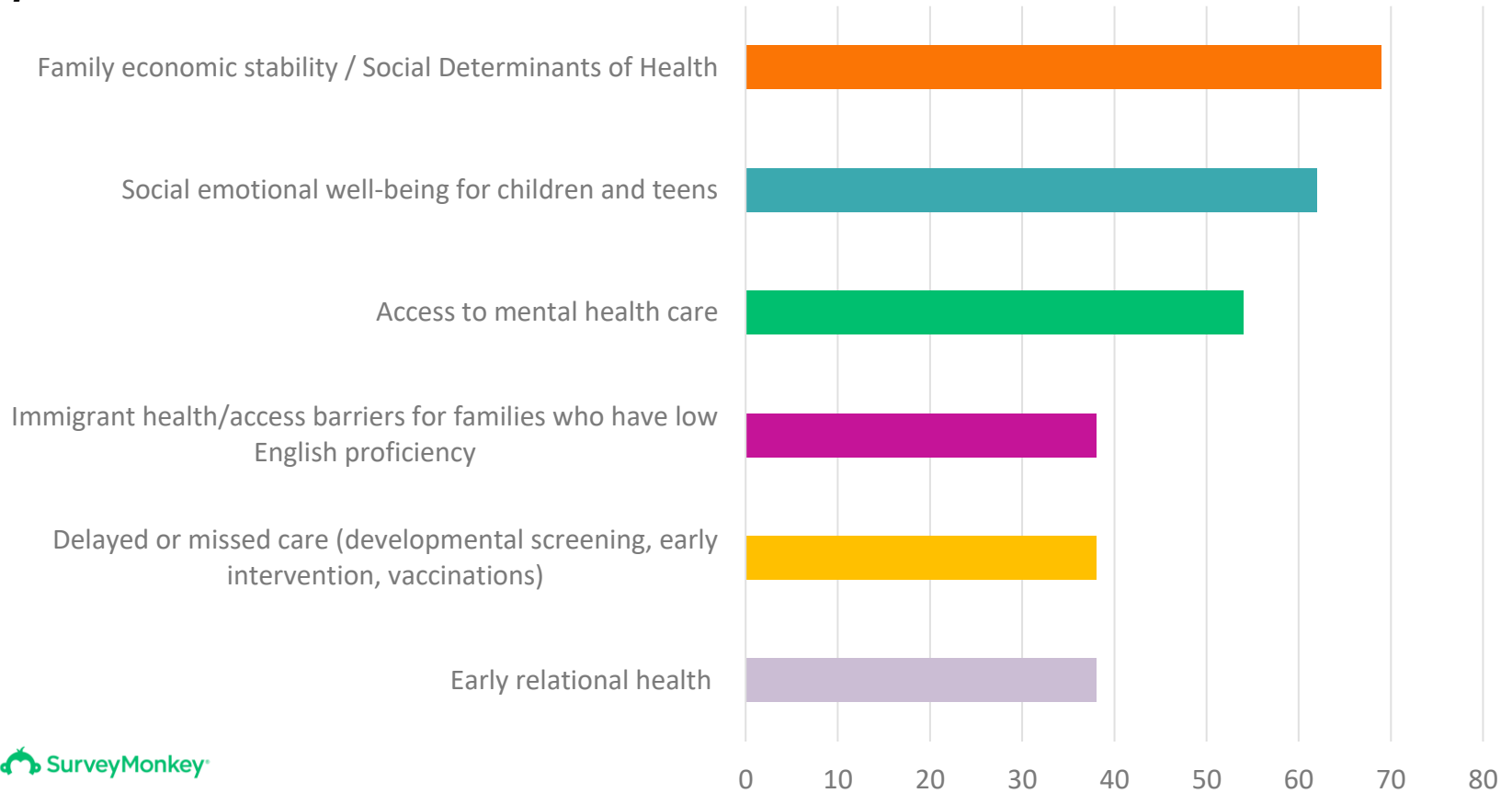

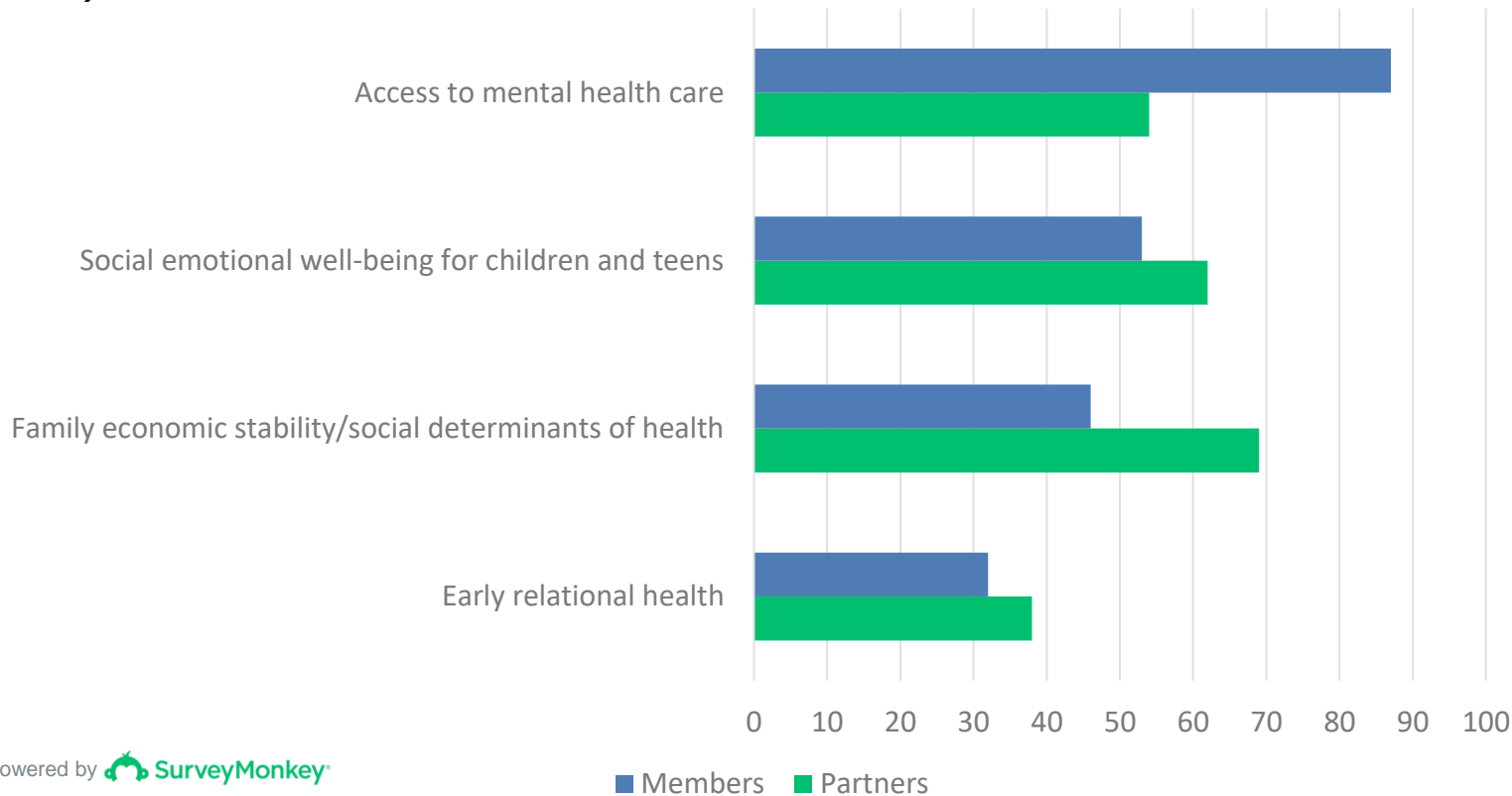
